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# SOME ESTIMATES FOR COMMUTATORS OF RIESZ TRANSFORM ASSOCIATED WITH SCHRÖDINGER TYPE OPERATORS 

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Abstract. Let $\mathcal{L}_{1}=-\Delta+V$ be a Schrödinger operator and let $\mathcal{L}_{2}=(-\Delta)^{2}+V^{2}$ be a Schrödinger type operator on $\mathbb{R}^{n}(n \geqslant 5)$, where $V \neq 0$ is a nonnegative potential belonging to certain reverse Hölder class $B_{s}$ for $s \geqslant n / 2$. The Hardy type space $H_{\mathcal{L}_{2}}^{1}$ is defined in terms of the maximal function with respect to the semigroup $\left\{\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{2}}\right\}$ and it is identical to the Hardy space $H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}$ established by Dziubański and Zienkiewicz. In this article, we prove the $L^{p}$-boundedness of the commutator $\mathcal{R}_{b}=b \mathcal{R} f-\mathcal{R}(b f)$ generated by the Riesz transform $\mathcal{R}=\nabla^{2} \mathcal{L}_{2}^{-1 / 2}$, where $b \in \operatorname{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$, which is larger than the space $\operatorname{BMO}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$. Moreover, we prove that $\mathcal{R}_{b}$ is bounded from the Hardy space $H_{\mathcal{L}_{2}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ into weak $L_{\text {weak }}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$.

Keywords: commutator; Hardy space; reverse Hölder inequality; Riesz transform; Schrödinger operator; Schrödinger type operator

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## 1. Introduction

The Schrödinger type operator is denoted by

$$
\mathcal{L}_{k}=(-\Delta)^{k}+V^{k} \quad \text { on } \mathbb{R}^{n}, n>2 k
$$

where $k \geqslant 1$ is a positive integer and $V(x)$ belongs to the reverse Hölder class $B_{s}$ for $s \geqslant n / 2$. When $k=1, \mathcal{L}_{1}$ is exactly the Schrödinger operator. In this paper, we focus on the operator $\mathcal{L}_{2}$, which has been studied in [19], [18], [3], [12], [11] and [14].

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Let $T$ be a bounded operator on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ for some $p$ with $p \in(1, \infty)$. In this paper, we consider the commutator operator

$$
T_{b}(f)(x)=T(b f)(x)-b(x) T f(x), \quad x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}
$$

where $b$ belongs to a function space, which needs not be the classical BMO space. See [4], [8] for the investigation of the commutator operator $T_{b}$ on Euclidean spaces $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ and [2], [5] on spaces of homogeneous type.

In recent years, many scholars have investigated the singular integral operators related to Schrödinger operators $\mathcal{L}_{1}$ and their commutators, see, for example, [17], [9], [7], [12], [1], [10], [16], [13], [15] and their references. Especially, when $b \in$ BMO, Guo, Li and Peng [7] investigated the boundedness of the commutators of the Riesz transform $\nabla \mathcal{L}_{1}^{-1 / 2}$. Furthermore, Bongioanni, Harboure and Salinas investigated the same problem when $b$ belongs to a larger space than the BMO in [1]. In this paper we denote the Riesz transform associated with the Schrödinger type operator $\mathcal{L}_{2}$ by $\mathcal{R}=\nabla^{2} \mathcal{L}_{2}^{-1 / 2}$. A natural problem is to study the boundedness of the commutator $\mathcal{R}_{b}$, where $b \in \mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$. The aim of our paper is to investigate this problem.

A nonnegative locally $L^{s}$-integrable function $V(1<s<\infty)$ is said to belong to $B_{s}$ if there exists a constant $C>0$ such that the reverse Hölder inequality

\begin{equation*}
\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} V^{s} \mathrm{~d} x\right)^{1 / s} \leqslant C\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} V \mathrm{~d} x\right) \tag{1.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

holds for every ball $B$ in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. Obviously, $B_{s_{2}} \subset B_{s_{1}}$, if $s_{2}>s_{1}$. But it is important that the $B_{s}$ class has the property of "self improvement", that is, if $V \in B_{s}$, then $V \in B_{s+\varepsilon}$ for some $\varepsilon>0$.

We assume the potential $V \in B_{q_{0}}$ for $q_{0} \geqslant n / 2$ throughout the paper. We introduce the auxiliary function $\varrho(x, V)=\varrho(x)$ defined by

$$
\varrho(x)=\frac{1}{m(x, V)}=\sup _{r>0}\left\{r: \frac{1}{r^{n-2}} \int_{B(x, r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y \leqslant 1\right\}, \quad x \in \mathbb{R}^{n} .
$$

It is known that $0<\varrho(x)<\infty$ for any $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ (from Lemma 2.2 in Section 2).
In order to study the endpoint estimates of the commutator $\mathcal{R}_{b}$, we recall some basic facts for the Hardy spaces associated with the Schrödinger type operator.

The Schrödinger operator $\mathcal{L}_{1}=-\Delta+V$ generates a $\left(C_{0}\right)$ semigroup $\left\{\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{1}}\right\}_{t>0}$. The maximal function with respect to the semigroup $\left\{\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{1}}\right\}_{t>0}$ is given by

$$
M^{\mathcal{L}_{1}} f(x)=\sup _{t>0}\left|\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{1}} f(x)\right| .
$$

The Hardy space $H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ associated with the Schrödinger operator $\mathcal{L}_{1}$ is defined as follows in terms of the maximal function mentioned above (cf. [6]).

Definition 1.1. A function $f \in L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ is said to be in $H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ if the semigroup maximal function $M^{\mathcal{L}_{1}} f$ belongs to $L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$. The norm of such a function is defined by

$$
\|f\|_{H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}}=\left\|M^{\mathcal{L}_{1}} f\right\|_{L^{1}}
$$

Correspondingly, the Schrödinger type operator $\mathcal{L}_{2}=(-\Delta)^{2}+V^{2}$ also generates a $\left(C_{0}\right)$ semigroup $\left\{\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{2}}\right\}_{t>0}$ (cf. [12]). The maximal function with respect to the semigroup $\left\{\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{2}}\right\}_{t>0}$ is given by

$$
M^{\mathcal{L}_{2}} f(x)=\sup _{t>0}\left|\mathrm{e}^{-t \mathcal{L}_{2}} f(x)\right| .
$$

The Hardy space $H_{\mathcal{L}_{2}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ associated with the Schrödinger operator $\mathcal{L}_{2}$ is defined as follows.

Definition 1.2. A function $f \in L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ is said to be in $H_{\mathcal{L}_{2}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ if the semigroup maximal function $M^{\mathcal{L}_{2}} f$ belongs to $L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$. The norm of such a function is defined by

$$
\|f\|_{H_{\mathcal{L}_{2}}^{1}}=\left\|M^{\mathcal{L}_{2}} f\right\|_{L^{1}}
$$

Theorem 1.1 in [3] implies that $H_{\mathcal{L}_{2}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)=H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ with equivalent norms.
Definition 1.3. Let $1<q \leqslant \infty$. A measurable function $a$ is called a $(1, q)_{\varrho}$-atom associated to the ball $B(x, r)$ if $r<\varrho(x)$ and the following conditions hold:
(1) $\operatorname{supp} a \subset B(x, r)$ for some $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $r>0$,
(2) $\|a\|_{L^{q}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)} \leqslant|B(x, r)|^{1 / q-1}$,
(3) when $r<\varrho(x) / 4, \int_{\mathbb{R}^{n}} a(x) \mathrm{d} x=0$.

The space $H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ admits the following atomic decompositions.
Proposition 1.1. Let $f \in L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$. Then $f \in H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ if and only if $f$ can be written as $f=\sum_{j} \lambda_{j} a_{j}$, where $a_{j}$ are $(1, q)_{\varrho}$-atoms and $\sum_{j}\left|\lambda_{j}\right|<\infty$. Moreover,

$$
\|f\|_{H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}} \sim \inf \left\{\sum_{j}\left|\lambda_{j}\right|\right\}
$$

where the infimum is taken over all atomic decompositions of $f$ into $H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}$-atoms.
Moreover, the function $b$ in this paper belongs to the new BMO space $\mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$, which is defined as follows (cf. Definition 1.4). It follows from [1] that the classical BMO space is a subspace of $\mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$.

Definition 1.4. The class $\mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$ consists of the locally integrable functions $b$ which satisfy

$$
\begin{equation*}
\frac{1}{|B(x, r)|} \int_{B(x, r)}\left|b(y)-b_{B}\right| \mathrm{d} y \leqslant C\left(1+\frac{r}{\varrho(x)}\right)^{\theta} \tag{1.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $r>0$, where $\theta>0$ and $b_{B}=(1 /|B|) \int_{B} b(y) \mathrm{d} y$.
A norm for $b \in \mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$, denoted by $[b]_{\theta}$, is given by the infimum of the constants satisfying (1.2), after identifying functions that differ upon a constant. If we let $\theta=0$ in (1.2), then $\mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$ is exactly the John-Nirenberg space BMO. Denote $\mathrm{BMO}_{\infty}(\varrho)=\bigcup_{\theta>0} \mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$.

Theorem 1.1. Let $V \in B_{q_{0}}$ with $q_{0} \geqslant n / 2, b \in \mathrm{BMO}_{\infty}(\varrho)$ and $p_{0}$ such that $1 / p_{0}=2 / q_{0}-2 / n$.
(i) If $1<p<p_{0}$, then

$$
\left\|\mathcal{R}_{b} f\right\|_{p} \leqslant C_{b}\|f\|_{p},
$$

for all $f \in L^{p}$.
(ii) If $p_{0}^{\prime}<p<\infty$ with $p_{0}^{\prime}=p_{0} /\left(p_{0}-1\right)$, then

$$
\left\|\mathcal{R}_{b}^{*} f\right\|_{p} \leqslant C_{b}\|f\|_{p}
$$

for all $f \in L^{p}$, where

$$
\mathcal{R}_{b}^{*} f(x)=b(x) \mathcal{R}^{*} f(x)-\mathcal{R}^{*}(b f)(x), x \in \mathbb{R}^{n} .
$$

Moreover, $C_{b} \leqslant C[b]_{\theta}$ whenever $b \in \mathrm{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$.
Theorem 1.2. Suppose $V \in B_{q_{0}}$ for some $q_{0} \geqslant n / 2$. Let $b \in \mathrm{BMO}_{\infty}(\varrho)$. Then, for any $\lambda>0$,

$$
\left|\left\{x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}:\left|\mathcal{R}_{b}(f)(x)\right|>\lambda\right\}\right| \leqslant C \frac{[b]_{\theta}}{\lambda}\|f\|_{H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)}, \quad f \in H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right),
$$

where the constant $C>0$ is independent of $f$. Namely, the commutator $\mathcal{R}_{b}$ is bounded from $H_{\mathcal{L}_{1}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ into $L_{\text {weak }}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$.

This paper is organized as follows. In this section, we set some notations and state our main results. In Section 2, we collect some lemmas which we need. In Section 3, we give the estimates of the kernels of $\mathcal{R}$ and $\mathcal{R}^{*}$. In Section 4, we prove the main results of this paper.

Throughout this paper, unless otherwise indicated, we will use $C$ to denote a positive constant, which is not necessarily the same at each occurrence and even can be different in the same line, and which depends at most on the dimension $n$ and the constant in (1.1). By $A \sim B$ we mean that there exists some constant $C>0$ such that $1 / C \leqslant A / B \leqslant C$.

## 2. Some lemmas

In this section, we collect some known results about the auxiliary function $\varrho(x)$, which have been proved in [17].

Lemma 2.1. $V \in B_{q_{0}}, q_{0} \geqslant n / 2$, is a doubling measure, i.e., there exists a constant $C>0$ such that

$$
\int_{B(x, 2 r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y \leqslant C \int_{B(x, r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y .
$$

Especially, there exist constants $\mu \geqslant 1$ and $C$ such that

$$
\int_{B(x, t r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y \leqslant C t^{n \mu} \int_{B(x, r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y
$$

holds for every ball $B(x, r)$ and $t>1$.

Lemma 2.2. There exist constants $C, k_{0}>0$ such that

$$
\frac{1}{C}\left(1+\frac{|x-y|}{\varrho(x)}\right)^{-k_{0}} \leqslant \frac{\varrho(y)}{\varrho(x)} \leqslant C\left(1+\frac{|x-y|}{\varrho(x)}\right)^{k_{0} /\left(k_{0}+1\right)}
$$

In particular, $\varrho(y) \sim \varrho(x)$ if $|x-y|<C \varrho(x)$.

## Lemma 2.3.

$$
\int_{B(x, R)} \frac{V(y) \mathrm{d} y}{|x-y|^{n-2}} \leqslant \frac{C}{R^{n-2}} \int_{B(x, R)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y .
$$

Moreover, if $V \in B_{n}$, then there exists $C>0$ such that

$$
\int_{B(x, R)} \frac{V(y) \mathrm{d} y}{|x-y|^{n-1}} \leqslant \frac{C}{R^{n-1}} \int_{B(x, R)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y .
$$

Lemma 2.4. (1) For $0<r<R<\infty$,

$$
\frac{1}{r^{n-2}} \int_{B(x, r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y \leqslant C\left(\frac{r}{R}\right)^{2-n / q_{0}} \frac{1}{R^{n-2}} \int_{B(x, R)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y
$$

and

$$
\frac{1}{r^{n-2}} \int_{B(x, r)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y \sim 1 \quad \text { if and only if } \quad r \sim \varrho(x) ;
$$

(2) There exist $C>0$ and $k_{0}^{\prime}>0$ such that

$$
\frac{1}{R^{n-2}} \int_{B(x, R)} V(y) \mathrm{d} y \leqslant C\left(1+\frac{R}{\varrho(x)}\right)^{k_{0}^{\prime}}
$$

We also need the following propositions (cf. [6]).

Proposition 2.1. There exists a sequence of points $\left\{x_{k}\right\}_{k=1}^{\infty}$ in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ such that the family of critical balls $Q_{k}=B\left(x_{k}, \varrho\left(x_{k}\right)\right), k \geqslant 1$, satisfies
(i) $\bigcup_{k} Q_{k}=\mathbb{R}^{n}$,
(ii) there exists $N$ such that for every $k \in \mathbb{N},\left|\left\{j: 4 Q_{j} \cap 4 Q_{k} \neq \emptyset\right\}\right| \leqslant N$.

Proposition 2.2 ([1], Proposition 3). Let $\theta>0$ and $1 \leqslant s<\infty$. If $b \in \operatorname{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$, then there exists a constant $C>0$ such that

$$
\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|b-b_{B}\right|^{s}\right)^{1 / s} \leqslant C[b]_{\theta}\left(1+\frac{r}{\varrho(x)}\right)^{\theta^{\prime}}
$$

for all $B=B(x, r)$, with $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $r>0$, where $\theta^{\prime}=\left(k_{0}+1\right) \theta$ and $k_{0}$ is the constant appearing in Lemma 2.2.

Lemma 2.5 ([1], Lemma 1). Let $b \in \operatorname{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho), B=B\left(x_{0}, r\right)$ and $s \geqslant 1$. Then there exists a constant $C>0$ such that

$$
\left(\frac{1}{\left|2^{k} B\right|} \int_{2^{k} B}\left|b-b_{B}\right|^{s}\right)^{1 / s} \leqslant C[b]_{\theta} k\left(1+\frac{2^{k} r}{\varrho\left(x_{0}\right)}\right)^{\theta^{\prime}}
$$

for all $k \in \mathbb{N}$, with $\theta^{\prime}$ as in Proposition 2.2.

Given $\alpha>0$, we define the following maximal functions for $g \in L_{\text {loc }}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ and $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ :

$$
\begin{gathered}
M_{\varrho, \alpha} g(x)=\sup _{x \in B \in \mathcal{B}_{\varrho, \alpha}} \frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|g|, \\
M_{\varrho, \alpha}^{\sharp} g(x)=\sup _{x \in B \in \mathcal{B}_{\varrho, \alpha}} \frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|g-g_{B}\right|,
\end{gathered}
$$

where $\mathcal{B}_{\varrho, \alpha}=\left\{B(y, r): y \in \mathbb{R}^{n}\right.$, and $\left.r \leqslant \alpha \varrho(y)\right\}$.
Lemma 2.6 ([1], Lemma 2). For $1<p<\infty$, there exist $\beta$ and $\gamma$ such that if $\left\{Q_{k}\right\}_{k=1}^{\infty}$ is a sequence of balls as in Proposition 2.1, then there exists a constant $C>0$ such that

$$
\int_{\mathbb{R}^{n}}\left|M_{\varrho, \beta} g(x)\right|^{p} \leqslant C\left(\int_{\mathbb{R}^{n}}\left|M_{\varrho, \gamma}^{\sharp} g(x)\right|^{p}+\sum_{k}\left|Q_{k}\right|\left(\frac{1}{\left|Q_{k}\right|} \int_{2 Q_{k}}|g|\right)^{p}\right)
$$

for all $g \in L_{\mathrm{loc}}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$.

## 3. Estimates for the kernels of $\mathcal{R}$ and $\mathcal{R}^{*}$

In this section, we give some estimates for the kernels of $\mathcal{R}$ and $\mathcal{R}^{*}$. These two operators have been investigated in [19], [18], [12], [3]. We denote by $\mathcal{K}$ and $\mathcal{K}^{*}$ the kernels of $\mathcal{R}$ and $\mathcal{R}^{*}$, respectively.

Lemma 3.1. Suppose $V \in B_{q_{0}}, q_{0}>n / 2$. Assume that $(-\Delta)^{2} u+\left(V(x)^{2}+\right.$ $\lambda) u=0$ in $B\left(x_{0}, 2 R\right)$ for some $x_{0} \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$. If $n / 2<q_{0}<2 n /(4-j)$, there exists a $k_{0}^{\prime}$ such that

$$
\left(\int_{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)}\left|\nabla^{j} u\right|^{t} \mathrm{~d} x\right)^{1 / t} \leqslant C R^{\left(n / q_{0}\right)-2}\left\{1+\operatorname{Rm}\left(x_{0}, V\right)\right\}^{k_{0}^{\prime}} \sup _{B\left(x_{0}, 2 R\right)}|u|,
$$

where $j=1,2$ and $1 / t=2 / q_{0}-(4-j) / n$.
Proof. We prove this lemma by a method similar to the one used in the proof of Lemma 7 in [18]. Let $\varphi \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(B\left(x_{0}, R\right)\right)$ such that $\varphi \equiv 1$ on $B\left(x_{0}, 3 R / 4\right), 0<\varphi \leqslant 1$. Also, $\varphi$ satisfies $\left|\nabla^{j} \varphi\right| \leqslant C R^{-j}$. Denote by $\Gamma_{0}(x, y, \lambda)$ the fundamental solution of $(-\Delta)^{2}+\lambda$. Following Theorem 5 in [12], we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|\nabla^{l} \Gamma_{0}(x, y, \lambda)\right| \leqslant \frac{C_{l}}{|x-y|^{n-4+l}}, \tag{3.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $l=1,2,3$.

Note that

$$
\begin{aligned}
u(x) \varphi(x)= & \int_{\mathbb{R}^{n}} \Gamma_{0}(x, y, \lambda)(-\Delta)^{2}(u \varphi)(y) \mathrm{d} y \\
= & \int_{\mathbb{R}^{n}} \Gamma_{0}(x, y, \lambda)\left(-V^{2}(y) u(y) \varphi(y)+4 \Delta \nabla u(y) \cdot \nabla \varphi(y)\right. \\
& \quad+2 \Delta(u(y) \Delta \varphi(y))-4 \nabla^{2} u(y) \cdot \nabla^{2} \varphi(y)-4 \nabla u(y) \cdot \nabla(\Delta \varphi(y)) \\
& \left.\quad-u(y) \Delta^{2} \varphi(y)\right) \mathrm{d} y .
\end{aligned}
$$

Then by integration by parts and (3.1) we get, for $x \in B\left(x_{0}, R / 2\right)$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left|\nabla^{j} u(x)\right| & \leqslant C \int_{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)} \frac{V^{2}(y)|u(y)||\varphi(y)|}{|x-y|^{n-4+j}} \mathrm{~d} y+\frac{C}{R^{n+j}} \int_{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)}|u(y)| \mathrm{d} y \\
& \leqslant C \sup _{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)}|u(y)|\left(\int_{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)} \frac{V^{2}(y)|\varphi(y)|}{|x-y|^{n-4+j}} \mathrm{~d} y+\frac{1}{R^{j}}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Then by the theorem on fractional integration, (1.1) and Lemma 2.4, we have

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left(\int_{B\left(x_{0}, R / 2\right)}\left|\nabla^{j} u(x)\right|^{t} \mathrm{~d} x\right)^{1 / t} & \leqslant C \sup _{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)}|u(x)|\left(\left(\int_{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)} V(x)^{q} \mathrm{~d} x\right)^{2 / q}+R^{2 n / q-4}\right) \\
& \leqslant C R^{2 n / q-4} \sup _{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)}|u(x)|\left(\frac{1}{R^{n-2}} \int_{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)} V(x) \mathrm{d} x+1\right) \\
& \leqslant C R^{2 n / q-4}\left(1+\operatorname{Rm}\left(x_{0}, V\right)\right)^{k_{0}^{\prime}} \sup _{B\left(x_{0}, R\right)}|u(x)|,
\end{aligned}
$$

where $1 / t=2 / q_{0}-(4-j) / n$.
Lemma 3.2. If $V \in B_{q_{0}}$ for $q_{0}>n / 2$, then we have:
(i) For every $N$, there exists a positive constant $C_{N}$ such that

Proof. (i) The proof can be found in the proof of Lemma 9 in [12].
(ii) Fix $x, z \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ such that $|x-z|<\varrho(x)$ and let $R=|x-z| / 8,1 / t=1 / q_{0}-3 / n$ and $\delta=4-2 n / q_{0}$.

\leqslant & \frac{C_{N}}{\left(1+\lambda^{1 / 2} R^{2}\right)^{N}\{1+R m(z, V)\}^{N}}\left\{\frac{1}{R^{n-4}} \int_{B(z, 5 R)} \frac{V^{2}(\xi)}{|\xi-z|^{n-2}} \mathrm{~d} \xi+\frac{1}{R^{n-2}}\right\}
\end{aligned}

where we use the fact that $6 R \leqslant|z-u| \leqslant 10 R$ and $|\xi-z| \sim|x-\xi|$.
According to Lemma 2.2,

& \times \frac{C_{N^{\prime}}}{\left(1+\lambda^{1 / 2} R^{2}\right)^{N^{\prime}}\{1+R m(x, V)\}^{N^{\prime}}}\left\{\frac{1}{R^{n-4}} \int_{B(z, 5 R)} \frac{V^{2}(\xi)}{|\xi-z|^{n-2}} \mathrm{~d} \xi+\frac{1}{R^{n-2}}\right\} \\
& \leqslant \frac{C_{N^{\prime \prime}} R^{-\delta}|x-y|^{\delta}}{\left(1+\lambda^{1 / 2} R^{2}\right)^{N^{\prime}}\{1+R m(x, V)\}^{N^{\prime \prime}}}\left\{\frac{1}{R^{n-4}} \int_{B(z, 5 R)} \frac{V^{2}(\xi)}{|\xi-z|^{n-2}} \mathrm{~d} \xi+\frac{1}{R^{n-2}}\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

For $k>2$,

\leqslant & \frac{C|x-y|^{\delta}}{R^{n-2+\delta}\{1+R m(x, V)\}^{N^{\prime \prime}}}\left\{\int_{B(z, 5 R)} \frac{V^{2}(\xi)}{|\xi-z|} \mathrm{d} \xi+\frac{1}{R^{2}}\right\},

(iii) When $q_{0}>n$, the term involving $V$ can be dropped from inequalities (3.4) and (3.5).

## 4. The proof of our main results

Before we prove our main results, we need to give some necessary lemmas. The method we adopted is similar to the one in [1].

Lemma 4.1. Let $V(x) \in B_{q_{0}}$ for $q_{0}>n / 2,1 / p_{0}=2 / q_{0}-2 / n$, and $b \in \operatorname{BMO}_{\theta}(\varrho)$. Then, for any $p_{0}^{\prime} \leqslant s<\infty$, there exists a constant $C>0$ such that

for all $f \in L_{\text {loc }}^{s}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ and every ball $Q=B\left(x_{0}, \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$. Additionally, if $q_{0}>n$, the above estimate also holds for $\mathcal{R}$ instead of $\mathcal{R}^{*}$.

Proof. Let $f \in L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ and $Q=B\left(x_{0}, \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$. First, we consider

If we write $f=f_{1}+f_{2}$ with $f_{1}=f_{\chi_{2 Q}}$, then by using the fact that $\mathcal{R}^{*}$ is bounded on $L^{s}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ with $p_{0}^{\prime} \leqslant s$, we have

To deal with $I_{1}(x)$, noting that $\varrho(x) \sim \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)$ and $|x-z| \sim\left|x_{0}-z\right|$, we split into annuli to obtain

& \leqslant C \inf _{y \in Q} M f(y) .

For $I_{2}(x)$, we assume $n / 2<q_{0}<n$ because of (iii) in Lemma 3.2. Then, since $x \in Q$,

& \leqslant C \sum_{k \geqslant 1} \frac{2^{-N k}}{\left(2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)^{n-2}} \int_{\left|x_{0}-z\right|<2^{k+1} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)}|f(z)| \int_{B\left(z, 2^{k+3}\left|x_{0}-z\right|\right)} \frac{V^{2}(u)}{|u-z|^{n-2} \mathrm{~d} u \mathrm{~d} z} \\
& \leqslant C \sum_{k \geqslant 1} \frac{2^{-N k}}{\left(2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)^{n-2}} \int_{\left|x_{0}-z\right|<2^{k+1} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)}|f| \mathcal{I}_{2}\left(V^{2} \chi_{\left.B\left(x_{0}, 2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)\right)} .\right.
\end{aligned}

Let $p_{0}^{\prime}<s<d$. First, using Hölder's inequality and the boundedness of the fractional integral $\mathcal{I}_{2}: L^{s^{\prime}} \rightarrow L^{q_{0} / 2}$ with $1 / s^{\prime}=2 / q_{0}-2 / n$, we have

& =C \frac{1}{\left(2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)^{2 n}}\left(2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)^{2 n / q_{0}}\left(\int_{B\left(x_{0}, 2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)} V\right)^{2} \\
& \leqslant C\left(2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)^{-2 n+2 n / q_{0}}\left(2^{k n \mu} \int_{B\left(x_{0}, \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)} V\right)^{2} \\
& \leqslant C 2^{-2 k n+2 n / q_{0}+2 k n \mu} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)^{-2 n+2 n / q_{0}} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)^{2(n-2)} \\

& =C \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)^{-n+2 n / q_{0}-2} \sum_{k \geqslant 1} 2^{-N k+k n\left(2 \mu-2+2 / q_{0}\right)}\left\|f \chi_{B\left(x_{0}, 2^{k} \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)}\right\|_{s} .

& =C\left(2^{k}\right)^{n / s}\left(\varrho\left(x_{0}\right)\right)^{n / s} \inf _{y \in Q} M_{s} f(y)
\end{aligned}
$$

and using the fact that $n / s^{\prime}=2 n / q_{0}+2$, we have

To deal with the second term of (4.1), we also split $f=f_{1}+f_{2}$. Choose $p_{0}^{\prime}<\tilde{s}<s$ and denote $v=\tilde{s} s /(s-\tilde{s})$. Using the boundedness of $\mathcal{R}^{*}$ on $L^{\tilde{s}}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ (cf. [12]) and using Hölder's inequality, we get

We start by observing that for $1 \leqslant \tilde{s}<s, v=\tilde{s} s /(s-\tilde{s})$, and using Lemma 2.5, we obtain

By the finite overlapping property given by Proposition 2.1 and the boundedness of $M_{s}$ in $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$, the second term is controlled by $[b]_{\theta}^{p}\|f\|_{p}^{p}$. Thus, we need to consider the first term.

Our goal is to find a pointwise estimate of $M_{\varrho, \gamma}^{\sharp}\left(\mathcal{R}_{b}^{*} f\right)$. Let $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $B=$ $B\left(x_{0}, r\right)$, with $r<\gamma \varrho\left(x_{0}\right)$ such that $x \in B$. If $f=f_{1}+f_{2}$, with $f_{1}=f \chi_{2 B}$, then we write
